What is 'SUSTAIN-EU'?

SUSTAIN-EU is an Erasmus+ project (Cooperation Partnerships in Vocational Education and Training) aiming to facilitate access to high-quality, future-oriented upskilling and reskilling opportunities for individuals (employees, learners, professionals and jobseekers) enabling them to qualify as Sustainability Experts

The project is implemented by a consortium of six organisations from Austria, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Portugal (coordinator) and Romania. Started on 01/11/2024, it will last until 31/10/2026.

SUSTAIN-EU will develop a new VET curriculum and qualification, for the Sustainability Expert profession, that builds on the latest green skills intelligence, highly compatible and adaptable to the changing skills needs
